Jonah's Call & Disobedience

- 1:1-2, God calls Jonah to Nineveh
- 1:3, Jonah flees from the presence of The Lord
- 1:4-6, God sends a storm to correct Jonah
- 1:7-16, Jonah's disobedience is revealed and judged

## Jonah 2

Jonah's Repentance & God's Redemption

Jonah's prayer of repentance to God

- 2:2, God hears prayer
- 2:4, Jonah stops fleeing from God's presence and starts embracing it
- 2:6, God is Jonah's savior
- 2:9, Jonah's commitment to follow God again

# Jonah 3

Jonah's Obedience & God's Mercy

- 3:1-2, God calls Jonah a 2nd time
- 3:3-5, Jonah brings God's message to the Ninevites
- 3:6-9, The Ninevites repent of their evil
  - 3:10, God shows his compassion to the Ninevites

# Jonah 4

Jonah's Selfishness & God's Compassion

- 4:1-4, Jonah admits why he didn't want to go to Nineveh
- 4:5-10, Jonah pouts about God's mercy toward the Ninevites while God comforts him
- 4:11, God's compassion for the Ninevites

## **Contemporary with Amos**

Israel is enjoying a time of relative prosperity and peace

Jeroboam II - King of Israel - Bad king (2 Kings 14:23-28) Nineveh is the capital city of the Assyrian empire

The Assyrians had a reputation for being exceptionally brutal to their enemies

Jonah is called to bring a message of God's judgement to the people of Nineveh with the availability of mercy through personal repentance

Israel is taken captive by the Assyrians in 722 B.C.
